2	1926.200 (b)	Does the program explain when danger signs will be utilized and do they conform to specifications?			Danger signs shall be used only where an immediate hazard exists, and shall follow the specifications illustrated in ANSI Z35 1-1968.

Caution signs shall be used only to warn against potential hazards or to caution against unsafe practices, and shall follow the specifications illustrated in Figure 4 of ANSI Z35 1-1968.

4	1926.200 (d)	Does the program explain when exit signs will be utilized and do they conform to specifications.			Exit signs, when required, shall be lettered in legible red letters, not less than 6 inches high, on a white field and the principal stroke of the letters shall be at least three-fourths inch in width.

5	1926.200 (e)	Does the program explain when safety instruction signs will be utilized and do they conform to specifications?			Safety instruction signs, when used, shall be white with green upper panel with white letters to convey the principal message. Any additional wording on the sign shall be black letters on the white background.

Directional signs, other than automotive traffic signs specified in paragraph (g) of CFR 1926.200(g) shall be white with a black panel and a white directional symbol.
